- · Communicate with us regarding specific needs or preferences you have for your child.

Additionally, we ask that each parent or guardian read this handbook carefully so you are aware of all our policies and procedures and are prepared to adhere to them at church.

CBCL is committed to welcoming and including children of all abilities in our children's programming. We recognize that children with disabilities and special needs may require additional support in order to participate in our children's activities. Parents or guardians of children needing additional support should contact the Children's Ministries deacon (see Team Directory section) in order to develop and agree upon an appropriate plan to best facilitate their child's successful inclusion.

About Children's Ministries at CBCL

Our Purpose

Children's Sunday School is a vitally important ministry to the Church. In Sunday School classes, dedicated volunteers teach children the life-changing truths of God's Word. Children not only learn the individual stories of the Bible but also the overarching story of God's Word—that God has chosen a people for Himself and has saved them through the death and resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ.

As a church, we want to help parents root their children in the truths of Scripture. Children's Ministries support parents by providing classes designed specifically to nurture and instruct our children in the faith.

While Sunday School is a great aid in helping parents raise their children in the Lord, we believe the bulk of instruction will take place within the home. Therefore, we not only want to help directly in the instruction of children, but we also want to equip parents. We earnestly desire to see families at home worshiping, learning, and praying together.

Our Goal

CBCL's ministries for children and students aim for one primary goal—to make the glory of the Lord known to the next generation, so that they would set their hope in Jesus Christ. (See Psalm 78:1-8)

In other words, our goal in ministering to children is **to bring the heart of the gospel to the heart of the child**. Through our ministries, children have opportunities to be instructed in God's Word, to be involved in fellowship, and to engage in worship, all of which prepare them for a life-long dedication to pursuing the Lord's unique call on their lives.

Policy Implementation And Review

The Children's Ministries Deacon, under the supervision of the Deacon Board, oversees the implementation and ongoing application of this Children's Ministries Sunday School Handbook. They may delegate to other church leaders or coordinators the responsibility for adherence to this handbook within their specific ministry or area.

This handbook may be revised at any time. Any changes in church policy, authoritative law or experience will be considered in revising this handbook. All revisions will be approved by the Deacon Board. When revisions are made, ministry leaders will communicate them to all team members affected by the policy changes.

Team Communication

The Children's Ministries team communicates mainly via WeChat and in person, but there may be times when email communication and access to digital documents is necessary.

All Children's Ministries Team members over the age of 16 must agree to regularly access the review the CBCL Children's Ministries team WeChat group, check their email at least weekly, and be responsive to communication from team leaders and other team members.

Parents/Guardians of Children's Ministries Team youth volunteers under the age of 16 must agree to the same and pass along all information to the youth volunteer.

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Child Protection Policies

PROTECTING CHILDREN BEFORE THEY ARRIVE

Our Commitment

All church leaders must become informed and take an active stance toward preventing child abuse in the church by screening staff and volunteers, training them in child protection, and actively maintaining child protection policies pertaining to our obligations to love our children and protect their rightful interests as God's image-bearers from the devastating actions of abusers. (Matthew 18:5-6)

Team Member Screening & Training

BACKGROUND CHECKS & SCREENING

At CBCL we take seriously the call in Scripture to nurture and teach our children. We share this responsibility as a church body by asking that members serve as volunteers in our Children's Ministries. Church leaders also reserve the right to deny an individual or remove a volunteer from serving with children at CBCL at any time and for any legal reason.

Because child safety is a paramount concern, all volunteers and staff (paid full-time and part-time) age 16 or older who work with children at CBCL must meet the following qualifications (and unless met will not count toward room staffing minimums):

- Be a member of CBCL or a regular attender for at least six months.
- Upon request, provide at least two (2) professional/personal references upon application to be conducted prior to any service with the church. The references are to be conducted by an authority within the church. The authority should note any information they tried to secure but could not verify or obtain.
- Consent to a background check. This will include both a national and Pennsylvania PATCH criminal records check at the outset, with the PATCH rechecked every three years.
- Read and agree to follow all policies and procedures detailed in this handbook by signing the Children's Ministries Volunteer Expectations at the end of this document.

Minor volunteers (under age 18): As older kids are valued in the care of our younger children, those in Grade 6 and up are permitted to serve but are considered as helpers (in addition to room staffing minimums). They are approved on an individual basis by ministry leaders and not subject to the screening/training specified above.

Upon age 16, minors may count toward room staffing minimums if screened and complete training, except background checks will not be conducted until age 18.

TRAINING

Team members who work with children may be required to complete child abuse and neglect awareness training (administered either by a qualified organization or individual as identified by the church).

They are encouraged to attend periodic training sessions that review this Children's Ministries Sunday School Handbook and allow for questions. Ongoing training is also promoted by having key policy and procedures from this handbook available to staff/volunteers to refer to when serving.

PROTECTING CHILDREN IN OUR CARE

Supervision And Visibility

As a general safety measure, interactions between staff/volunteers and children should be observable and interruptible by others. When children are present at church programs a minimum of two staff/ volunteers should be in the room at all times.

If a staff/volunteer needs to step out of the room (including to use the restroom) and doing so would violate this rule, another staff/volunteer must stand-in for the individual. (Note, a deacon on duty should be contacted for help if necessary.)

Should a child arrive when only one staff/volunteer is in the room, the parent should be asked to stay until the second staff/volunteer arrives. If the child was unaccompanied, the staff/volunteer should keep doors to the room open and alert the deacon on duty of the situation.

Staff/volunteers should not remove a child from a room at any time (including taking a crying child out of the room to settle down). However, a staff/volunteer may take an older, school- aged child to the hallway just outside the room for a short period (e.g. to discuss a behavior problem) if it does not violate the two-person room minimum and they remain visible to another staff/volunteer. In instances when an older child needs to take a break from class (e.g. feeling overwhelmed in a noisy room), the child may be allowed to sit just outside the classroom door if a staff/volunteer remains in the doorway (in view of other staff/volunteers in the room) and monitors the child the entire time.

STAFFING CONSIDERATIONS

- A reasonable ratio of staff/volunteers to children should be maintained at all times.
- It is preferred that when only two staff/volunteers are present with children (especially with young children or during off-site activities) that they are unrelated to each other (not spouses, siblings, parent/child).

EXCEPTIONS

Transferring children between rooms: It is reasonable for one staff/volunteer to escort children between rooms through public areas if predetermined as part of a class/program schedule.

Off-site ministry activities: The two-person staffing rule should also be followed in ministry- related situations off-site. However, in some instances it is reasonable for a staff/volunteer to be one-on-one with an older child if they remain in public areas at all times (e.g. on walks or visits to restaurants and the other adult leaves to use the restroom). A staff/volunteer may be one-on-one with a child in a private residence (e.g. youth meeting) if they remain in public areas with all doors to the room open and if another adult is in the residence.

Drop-Off And Pick-Up

Parents entering children's rooms: To maintain a safe, accurate and smooth check-in and check-out process, parents should enter the room at the discretion of the staff and volunteers. Parents may at times need to be present in the room, e.g. to transition a hesitant child, soothe or assist an upset child, or help if the room is abnormally busy.

Special Events: An alternate check-in method (e.g. sign-in sheet) may be used during off-site events involving a more secure, designated group (e.g. church getaway).

Drop-in Activities: Some events may be more "drop-in" in nature, or in public areas like parks where children may already be present and unaccompanied. To participate in these events, children are required to either be accompanied by a parent/guardian, or receive parent/guardian permission to participate, typically by a permission slip or registration form. Parents will be notified of the beginning and ending times of events, and are responsible for the pickup of their children at the appropriate time.

Contacting Parents or Deacon On Duty

Parents will be contacted if needed for their child (e.g. text message). If a parent does not respond, a staff or volunteer may then try to find that person within the building.

Staff or volunteers in a children's room who need additional assistance for any reason should contact (e.g. text message) the deacon on duty.

Bathroom Procedures

Children 4 years and older (who can independently use the toilet) are allowed to take themselves to the bathroom. However, for children ages 4 and 5, a staff/volunteer should stand in the classroom doorway most visible to the restroom to monitor children to and from the restroom. If there is no such visibility of the bathroom, then one or more staff/volunteers may escort children to the bathroom only if doing so leaves at least two other staff/volunteers in the room with the other children. The staff/volunteers should stand outside the door to the restroom and should NOT enter the bathroom. A staff/volunteer should never be alone with a child in a bathroom with the door closed or in a closed bathroom stall. If none of these conditions are met or the child needs additional assistance, please contact the parent to escort the child to the bathroom.

Health & Wellness

In order to provide a safe, healthy environment for all our children, staff and volunteers, we ask parents to refrain from bringing children to nursery or classes if they exhibit any of the symptoms below. The same applies to teachers, volunteers and staff scheduled to serve with the children. If a child develops any of these symptoms while in our care, a parent will be contacted to pick up the child.

- suspected illness or child is feeling unwell
- fever, vomiting, or diarrhea in the last 24 hours
- runny nose not clear in color (or excessive discharge of any color)
- cough, sore throat (including strep, croup)
- head lice (should be free of nits)

- contagious infection or rash ("pink-eye", impetigo, etc.)
- symptoms of communicable diseases (chicken pox, mumps, measles, etc.)
- use of antibiotics for 24 hours or less

Physical Interactions

Healthy relationships with their caregivers and teachers allow children to feel safe and secure. Appropriate touch is part of a positive, nurturing environment. To ensure all interactions with our children are above reproach, these guidelines are to be carefully followed by team members:

EXAMPLES OF APPROPRIATE PHYSICAL INTERACTIONS:

- handshakes, high-fives and fist bumps
- a brief, assuring pat on the head, back or shoulder
- walking hand-in-hand with young children
- hand holding during prayer
- side hugs (an arm around the shoulder)
- brief front hugs (within sight of others; best if child initiated)
- infants and toddlers may be held, hugged, rocked and have their backs rubbed

EXAMPLES OF INAPPROPRIATE PHYSICAL INTERACTIONS:

- corporal punishment or physical abuse
- sexual abuse or any contact for sexual gratification
- tickling or wrestling
- kissing
- rubbing/massaging a child older than toddler (age 4+)
- prolonged or lingering hugs or other close physical contact not allowed above
- lap sitting with a child older than toddler (age
- carrying a child (including "piggy-back" rides) who is not an infant or toddler (age 4+)

Discipline

Staff/volunteers should promote a loving, respectful, and orderly atmosphere in which children can worship, learn, play, and interact with others by:

- proactively reminding children of and directing them toward acceptable activities,
- verbally encouraging and reinforcing positive behavior,
- and, when necessary, redirecting inappropriate behavior.

If a child is having difficulty following instructions or is being repeatedly disruptive, the child may be asked to take a break in a different area of the room for a set time or until the child is ready to participate appropriately. If none of these measures is effective, or the child exhibits behavior that could be harmful to themselves or others, the child's parent should be contacted and the deacon on duty notified. If a child has been bitten or injured by another child, the deacon on duty should be notified, who in turn will notify the parents of both children.

Staff/volunteers are prohibited from swearing or using any form of physical punishment or discipline with children.

Cleanliness

Staff/volunteers are also asked to keep rooms clean and in order by following clean-up procedures posted in the room or communicated by deacons or leaders. Children should also be encouraged to help as a way of caring for and serving our church.

Injury

Although we strive to provide a safe environment, the nature of children's activities occasionally leads to accidents, which should be handled as follows:

- Any life-threatening situations should be given immediate medical attention by contacting 911; parents and a deacon on duty should then be promptly notified.
- Staff/volunteers may attend to minor cuts, scrapes and bumps (e.g. applying a bandage or cold pack). A first aid kit is accessible in the children's areas (contents per the discretion of the Children's Ministries Leaders).
- Any injury or illness should be reported to the deacon on duty, who will in turn notify a parent (since trivial injuries can turn out to be serious).
- Once a child has received attention, the staff/volunteer or deacon on duty will complete an incident report (attached) for any injuries beyond minor cuts or scrapes.

No medications are allowed in children's rooms except inhalers, EpiPens, or other required emergency medication, which may be administered by those trained. However, CBCL will not be responsible for any "Good Samaritan" assistance offered by any of its congregants.

Food & Allergies

Food and snacks may be served to certain age-groups of children under our care. To be welcoming of those with food allergies and dietary restrictions, nutritional and ingredient information for regularly served food will be made available if needed. Occasionally other food may be served (e.g. as part of a lesson or special celebration) and such will be communicated to parents (e.g. an announcement in the service prior to children's dismissal or posting an "Allergy Alert" at the check-in station or classroom door).

If a child is allergic to churchprovided snacks or needs any special accommodations during snack time (e.g. refraining from snack or alternate food), parents must speak with a Children's Ministries leader or deacon on duty BEFORE leaving their children.

Emergency Evacuation

In the event of an emergency, staff/volunteers are responsible for leading the children in their room safely out of the building. Deacons and church officers should assist with this process. The general evacuation plan for all sites is as follows:

- Have the children in your room form a line. Younger children should pair-up and hold hands.
- Verify against a child roster or check-in records that all children are accounted for in your room. Take the roster/ record with you when you leave.
- With one staff/volunteer at the beginning of the line and another at the end, lead the children out of the building.
- Once outside, lead the children a safe distance from the building or to any location agreed upon for your site.
- Recheck attendance to make sure that everyone is accounted for and await further instructions.

Note: Parents should evacuate the building utilizing the nearest exit, then find their children once outside. Parents flooding the children's areas would cause congestion and prevent the children from being safely evacuated from the building.

REPORTING SUSPECTED ABUSE

CBCL is committed to providing a safe and nurturing environment for all children entrusted in our care (where "child" means anyone under the age of eighteen). It is the responsibility of staff and volunteers serving as caregivers or teachers at CBCL to act in the best interest of children at all times.

CBCL has a zero tolerance for abuse in its programs and ministry activities. The policies and procedures outlined in this handbook are in place for the protection of both our children and our volunteers and staff.

Our hope is that children never encounter these kinds of situations. However, understanding we live in a broken world and seeking to protect children in the church from anyone with intentions to hurt or abuse them, it is important and necessary to define these terms.

What Is Child Abuse?

Child abuse, according to the Child Protective Services Law (CPSL), means to intentionally, knowingly or recklessly do any of the following:

- Cause bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act;
- Fabricate, feign, or intentionally exaggerate or induce a medical symptom or disease which results in a potentially harmful medical evaluation or treatment to the child through any recent act;
- Cause or substantially contribute to serious mental injury to a child through any act or failure to act or a series of such acts or failures
- Cause sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any act or failure to act;
- Create a reasonable likelihood of bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act:
- Create a likelihood of sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any recent act or failure to act:
- Cause serious physical neglect of a child;
- Cause the death of the child through any act or failure to act; or
- Engage a child in a severe form of trafficking in persons or sex trafficking.

Child abuse also includes certain acts in which the act itself constitutes abuse without any resulting injury or condition. These recent acts include any of the following:

- Kicking, biting, throwing, burning, stabbing, or cutting a child in a manner that endangers the child;
- Unreasonably restraining or confining a child, based on consideration of the method, location or the duration of the restraint or confinement:
- Forcefully shaking a child under one year of
- Forcefully slapping or otherwise striking a child under one year of age;
- Interfering with the breathing of a child;
- Causing a child to be present during the operation of a methamphetamine laboratory, provided that the violation is being investigated by law enforcement; and/or
- Leaving a child unsupervised with an individual, other than the child's parent, who the parent knows or reasonably should have known was required to register as a Tier II or III sexual offender or has been determined to be a sexually violent predator or violent delinquent.

As pertaining to the CPSL, "recent" is defined as an abusive act within two years from the date the report is made to ChildLine. Sexual abuse, serious mental injury, serious physical neglect, and deaths have no time limit.

Mandated Reporting

Per Pennsylvania law, individuals — paid or unpaid — who, on the basis of the individuals' role as an integral part of a regularly scheduled program, activity, or service, are responsible for the child's welfare or has direct contact with children are considered mandated reporters and are required to report suspected child abuse if they have reasonable cause to suspect that a child is a victim of child abuse.


By this definition, CBCL Children's Ministries Sunday School volunteers, church deacons, and other church leadership including ministers are mandated reporters.

HOW TO REPORT

Mandated reporters must make an immediate and direct report of suspected child abuse to ChildLine either electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis or by calling 1-800-932-0313.

After making the report to ChildLine, mandated reporters are required to immediately thereafter notify the person in charge of the institution, school, facility, or agency or the designated agent of the person in charge. For CBCL, that means you should notify the Children's Minsitry deacon and/or the Deacon on Duty that you have made a report to ChildLine.

If an oral report was made to ChildLine, a report of suspected child abuse (CY-47) must also be completed and forwarded to the county children and youth agency within 48 hours after making the report. This form can be obtained at www.KeepKidsSafe.pa.gov or from the children and youth agency. If a report is made electronically, no CY-47 is required to be completed.



MANDATED REPORTERS

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the Child Protective Services Law (CPSL)?

The PA Child Protective Services Law (CPSL) was signed into law in 1975. It was enacted to protect children from abuse, allow the opportunity for healthy growth and development, and, whenever possible, preserve and stabilize the family.

What is child abuse?

Child abuse, according to the CPSL, means to intentionally, knowingly or recklessly do any of the following:

- Cause bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act;
- Fabricate, feign, or intentionally exaggerate or induce a medical symptom or disease which results in a potentially harmful medical evaluation or treatment to the child through any recent act;
- Cause or substantially contribute to serious mental injury to a child through any act or failure to act or a series of such acts or failures to act;
- Cause sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any act or failure to act:

- Create a reasonable likelihood of bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act;
- Create a likelihood of sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any recent act or failure to act:
- Cause serious physical neglect of a child;
- Cause the death of the child through any act or failure to act; or
- Engage a child in a severe form of trafficking in persons or sex trafficking, as those terms are defined under section 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (114 Stat. 1466, 22 U.S.C. § 7102).

Child abuse also includes certain acts in which the act itself constitutes abuse without any resulting injury or condition. These recent acts include any of the following:

- Kicking, biting, throwing, burning, stabbing, or cutting a child in a manner that endangers the child;
- Unreasonably restraining or confining a child, based on consideration of the method, location or the duration of the

restraint or confinement;

- Forcefully shaking a child under one year of age;
- Forcefully slapping or otherwise striking a child under one year of age;
- Interfering with the breathing of a child:
- Causing a child to be present during the operation of a methamphetamine laboratory, provided that the violation is being investigated by law enforcement; and/or
- Leaving a child unsupervised with an individual, other than the child's parent, who the parent knows or reasonably should have known was required to register as a Tier II or III sexual offender or has been determined to be a sexually violent predator or violent delinquent.

As pertaining to the CPSL, "recent" is defined as an abusive act within two years from the date the report is made to ChildLine. Sexual abuse, serious mental injury, serious physical neglect, and deaths have no time limit.





MANDATED REPORTERS | FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who can be a perpetrator?

A perpetrator of child abuse can be a:

- Child's parent;
- Spouse or former spouse of the parent;
- Paramour or former paramour of the parent;
- Person 14 years of age or older responsible for the welfare of a child or having direct contact with children as an employee of child care services, a school, or through a program, activity or service, such as a baby sitter or day care staff person;
- Person 14 years of age or older residing in the same home as the child;
- Relative who is 18 years of age or older who does not reside in the same home as the child, but is related within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity by birth or adoption to the child; or
- An individual 18 years of age or older who engages a child in severe forms of trafficking in persons or sex trafficking, as those terms are defined under section 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (114 Stat. 1466, 22 U.S.C. § 7102).

A perpetrator of child abuse for failure to act can be a:

- Child's parent;
- Spouse or former spouse of the parent;

- Paramour or former paramour of the parent; or
- Person 18 years of age or older who is responsible for the child's welfare or who resides in the same home as the child.

Mandated reporters do not have to determine whether or not the person meets the definition of perpetrator in order to make the report.

Who is a mandated reporter?

The following adults are considered mandated reporters and are required to report suspected child abuse if they have reasonable cause to suspect that a child is a victim of child abuse:

- Individuals licensed or certified to practice in any health-related field under the jurisdiction of the Department of State
- Medical examiner, coroner, or funeral director
- Employees of a health care facility or providers licensed by the Department of Health who are engaged in the admission, examination, care, or treatment of individuals.
- School employees
- Employees of child care services who have direct contact with children in the course of employment.
- Clergymen, priests, rabbis, ministers, Christian Science practitioners, religious healers, or spiritual leaders of any regularly established church

or other religious organization.

- Individuals paid or unpaid who, on the basis of the individuals' role as an integral part of a regularly scheduled program, activity, or service, are responsible for the child's welfare or has direct contact with children
- Employees of a social services agency who has direct contact with children in the course of employment
- Peace officers or law enforcement officials
- Emergency medical services providers certified by the Department of Health
- Employees of a public library who have direct contact with children in the course of employment
- Individuals supervised or managed by a person listed above, who have direct contact with children in the course of employment
- Independent contractors who has direct contact with children
- Attorneys affiliated with an agency, institution, organization or other entity, including a school or regularly established religious organization that are responsible for the care, supervision, guidance, or control of children
- Foster parents
- Adult family members who are responsible for the child's welfare and provide services to a child in a





family living home, community home for individuals with an intellectual disability or host home for children which are subject to supervision or licensure by the department under Articles IX and X of the Human Services Code.

When must mandated reporters make a report?

Mandated reporters are required to make a report of suspected child abuse if they have reasonable cause to suspect that a child is a victim of child abuse under any of the following circumstances:

- They come into contact with the child in the course of employment, occupation, and practice of a profession or through a regularly scheduled program, activity or service;
- They are directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance, or training of the child, or are affiliated with an agency, institution, organization, school, regularly established church, or religious organization or other entity that is directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance, or training of the child:
- A person makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that an identifiable child is the victim of child abuse: or
- An individual 14 years of age or older

makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that the individual has committed child abuse.

It is not required that the child come before the mandated reporter in order to make a report of suspected child abuse nor are they required to identify the person responsible for the child abuse to make a report of suspected child abuse.

What if a mandated reporter has general concerns about a child, but does not suspect abuse?

Concerns related to the safety of children including, but not limited to inadequate housing, clothing, and supervision, can be referred to ChildLine or the county children and youth agency for assessment as general protective services cases.

How do mandated reporters report suspected child abuse?

Mandated reporters must make an immediate and direct report of suspected child abuse to ChildLine either electronically at www.compass. state.pa.us/cwis or by calling 1-800-932-0313.

Does anyone within my institution, school, facility, or agency need to be notified after a report is made?

After making the report to ChildLine, mandated reporters are required to immediately thereafter notify the person in charge of the institution, school, facility, or agency or the designated agent of the person in charge.

What else must be done after making a report to ChildLine?

If an oral report was made to ChildLine, a report of suspected child abuse (CY 47) must also be completed and forwarded to the county children and youth agency within 48 hours after making the report. This form can be obtained at www.KeepKidsSafe. pa.gov or from the children and youth agency. If a report is made electronically, no CY-47 is required to be completed.

Does a mandated reporter have to know for sure that the child was abused?

A mandated reporter is responsible to make the report when they suspect a child is a victim of abuse.

Are mandated reporters required to report when they learn of the abuse from someone other than the child who was allegedly abused?

Nothing requires a child to come before the mandated reporter in order to make a report.

Does a mandated reporter have to give their name?

The law requires that the mandated

reporter identify themselves and where they can be reached. This information is helpful so that if clarification on the situation or additional information is needed, the Children & Youth caseworker can contact the reporter.

Will the name of the mandated reporter be released?

The identity of the person making the report is kept confidential with the exception of being released to the law enforcement officials or the district attorney's office.

What if a mandated reporter fails to follow the law?

The penalties for a mandated reporter who willfully fails to report child abuse range from a misdemeanor of the second degree to a felony of the second degree.

Will a mandated reporter have to testify in court?

Mandated reporters may be required to testify in civil or criminal court cases, including juvenile or criminal court proceedings.

What happens after a report is made?

 ChildLine forwards the report of suspected child abuse to the local county Children & Youth agency, which investigates the report to determine if the allegations can be

- substantiated as child abuse/neglect The necessary services are also arranged for or provided to prevent the further maltreatment of the child and to preserve the family unit.
- The county Children & Youth agency must begin an investigation with 24 hours. A thorough inquiry is conducted to determine if the child was abused and what services are appropriate for the child and family. This investigation must be completed within 30 days unless the agency provides justification as to why the investigation cannot be completed, including attempts being made to obtain medical records or interview subjects of the report.
- If the alleged perpetrator named in the report does not meet the definition of perpetrator under the CPSL, but does suggest the need for investigation, ChildLine will forward the information to the district attorney's office in the respective county.

How does a mandated reporter learn what happened on the report they have made and what the agency is doing to protect the child from further abuse?

Mandated reporters will receive information from the department regarding the final status of the report — whether it was unfounded, indicated or founded, as well as the services planned or provided to protect the child.

What will be done for the child?

Pennsylvania is committed to advancing child-protection policies and practices that, when possible. keep children safely in their own homes connected to nurturing and protective adults. Under Pennsylvania law, it is the responsibility of the county Children & Youth agency to investigate reports of child abuse and neglect or assess a family for General Protective Services. County Children & Youth agencies, in partnership with families and community-based agencies, strive to provide services to prevent any further abuse of the child and to ensure the child's well-being and healthy development.

The county agency and its partners work to strengthen the child's family toward breaking the cycle of abuse and to preserve the family, whenever possible. Should the child be found to be in danger of continued harm, the county agency may petition the court to have the child removed from the home and ongoing court monitoring to determine if the child can safely be reunited with his/her family.





Sunday School

Sunday School provides instruction in the basics of the faith from caring and involved teachers. Using **Dwell** curriculum from Faith Alive Resources during the school year, children in Kindergarten through Grade 8 learn God's story of redemption from Genesis through Revelation.

Each summer, we use Children's Pilgrim's Progress and Kids Quest Catechism Club from Great Commission Publication.

Classes meet from 11:00 am - 12:15 pm on Sunday mornings.

Sunday School Teachers are required to attend trainings and quarterly meetings. This ensures that all teachers can work together as a team to achieve our ministry purpose and goal.

K-5 Sunday School Special Events

Special events are scheduled periodically throughout the year to highlight holidays and other important church and cultural occasions.

Teachers should plan to assist with and attend at least three special events each ministry year.

One "No Regular Lesson" events are included in the schedule each semester to allow teachers to focus an entire Sunday School hour to a special event, as well as provide a make-up week in case of a cancellation due to weather or other unplanned interruption.



John Bunyan his beloved classic The Pilgrim's Progress in two parts, first published in London in 1678 and the second in 1684. He originally titled it The Pilgrim's Progress from This World to That Which Is to Come. This book is a young reader's adaptation of the first part of the book.

This version is designed to capture children's imaginations and introduce them to Bunyan's enduring masterpiece. It will captivate them as they follow Christian on his adventurous journey as well as teach them great biblical truths they can hold onto as they grow in faith.

Some of the scenes have been condensed, and the language has been rewritten to appeal to children. But the essence of the story is the same: one Christian's walk of faith to the glorious goal.

Children will discover many important truths, including:

- a deeper understanding of Christ and the gospel
- the necessity of God's Word, the Holy Spirit, and other believers for teaching, instruction, encouragement, and support
- the true definition of a Christian

- a picture of the Christian life—a pilgrim's journey with ups and downs, distractions, difficulties, and even feelings of being cut off from God as a believer presses toward the grand end
- insight into the heart and character of Christians and those who only claim to know Christ

Children may not remember all the details nor grasp all the allegorical concepts, but we pray they will come to love the story and truths that it illustrates. Our hope is that this sows a seed that will cause them to read the story again and again as they grow in faith and find encouragement and help in their own ongoing pilgrim's progress.

Basic, Deep Theology for Kids

Theology is just teaching the truths about God! One of the best ways to teach theology is through using catechism. Catechism is simple questions and answers that help children learn answers to BIG truths. Whether taught around the dinner table or in one of those lines we find ourselves waiting in, kids can learn these deep truths in fun and engaging ways.

Why Catechism?

Catechism is a primer on the Christian faith in general and the Reformed faith in particular. It is intended to be used with children, beginning at the earliest age feasible.

The structure and content are drawn from the Catechism for Young Children, originally published in 1840 by Joseph P. Engels. His work was an effort to introduce and simplify the concepts of the Shorter Catechism—one part of the Westminster Standards.

Catechizing—systematic instruction using simple questions and answers—is a tried and effective tool for spiritual nurture. This has been a common form for expressing and memorizing key elements of the Bible and our system of doctrine. The objective of First Catechism is to make that process work better and with greater dynamic impact in the lives of the learners.

First Catechism teaches children to know, love and serve God.

Children add to their vocabulary the words that reflect biblical truth and especially the doctrines of grace. This will prepare them to take on a God-ward perspective toward themselves, God, and his creation. It should be regarded as a steppingstone for young people to later study the Westminster Shorter Catechism.





We are excited and grateful to have you partner with the church as we nurture and teach the youngest in our community. This handbook is intended to help you serve joyfully and confidently by knowing what to expect during your time together with the children, providing clear policies and procedures to follow. Therefore, we ask that you read this handbook carefully and apply these things as you care for the children within the church.

We also ask those who serve with our children to commit to:

- Arrive on-time for service and communicate any last-minute emergencies to the CBCL Children's Ministries Deacon.
- Care for the children in a way that models God's love for them. Be quick to encourage children and affirm positive behavior and never using any form of physical punishment.
- Spend your time with the children engaging them in meaningful ways (e.g. playing with young children, reading Bible stories with enthusiasm, share about living out your faith with older kids).
- When applicable, be a prepared teacher, reading and meditating on the lesson or Scripture in advance, for God's work in our hearts and lives overflows to our students.
- Be responsive to volunteer communications and follow protocols when scheduling conflicts arise.
- Avoid the possession or use of weapons/dangerous items in the presence of children.
- Avoid the possession, use or being under the influence of alcohol, tobacco and vaping products, and heavy pain medication in the presence of children; using and possessing illegal drugs is prohibited.
- Refrain from cell phone and other device usage in children's rooms except as allowed in this handbook (e.g. contacting parents, calling 911). Phones should be on vibrate/silent.
- Make an effort to attend training sessions for those working with children when offered.
- Participate in planning and execution of Children's Ministries special events throughout the year.
